

## The Ontological Convergence of Elizabethan Skepticism and Universal Monism: A Comparative Analysis of Shakespeare's Hamlet and The Pramod Effect

The exploration of human consciousness and the nature of existence has historically oscillated between the recognition of dualistic conflict and the pursuit of unified coherence. Within the Western literary tradition, William Shakespeare's "To be, or not to be" soliloquy stands as the definitive articulation of existential binarism, a state where the individual is suspended between the opposing forces of life and death, action and inaction, and presence and absence.
